We would like to thank both children and parents for working so closely with school to improve our whole school attendance this term. Our whole school attendance has ended the term on 95.4%. There is still a little work to get us over that magic 97% but with your co-operation this is something we can achieve.

Please make sure your child is in school for **every day** that school is open and to avoid taking holidays during term time.

Children must arrive on time everyday and the school day starts at 8.45am. We are seeing a rise in the number of children arriving late through the school office. We need to improve this as this does affect your child's attendance.

If your child is unwell you must ring the school office **each day** of your child's absence. For medical appointments evidence must be supplied to the school for this to be authorised.

Children return to school on **MONDAY 5TH JANUARY 2026** where we will be running our attendance reward cards.

Each child will have a card and they will receive a stamp for attending school everyday and on time. If they fill their cards children will receive an attendance prize. Let's get collecting lots of stamps!

New analysis of road casualty data by 'Brake' revealed that **every 19 days** the equivalent of a whole class of young children is killed or seriously injured on Britain's roads.

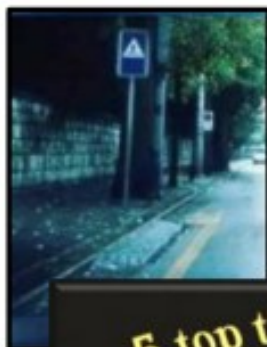


BE BRIGHT, BE SEEN!

At this time of year, I always like to remind everyone about the vulnerability of children near our roads. With reduced visibility as evenings close in and the autumn / winter weather this becomes even more relevant. Below are my annual safety tips so that you can discuss with your child/ren how important it is to be visible when near roads.

These tips emphasise how wearing brightly coloured clothing shows up well in daylight but, as it gets dark, reflective clothing and accessories are far more effective in signalling pedestrians or cyclists to drivers.

If you're a driver, remember it will be more difficult for you to see pedestrians and cyclists when it's dark or raining / snowing. Unlike this image, not everyone will be dressed in bright colours or reflective clothing. Children and others often wear dark coloured school uniform, winter coats or blazers.



To illustrate the point, there's a child in the same position on both photos (left). Which one is easier to see?

5 top tips on how to **BE BRIGHT & BE SEEN**

- 1** Brightly coloured or fluorescent clothing shows up well in daylight and at dusk when you're heading to and from school.
- 2** If you're out and about when it's dark, wear reflective gear to make sure you can be seen in car headlights. Reflective vests, sashes or wristbands work well. Remember, fluorescent clothing doesn't work after dark!
- 3** Don't forget to accessorise! Even small items such as clip-on reflectors, armbands and stickers on your outfit or school bag are a great way to improve your visibility.
- 4** If you like to cycle, remember that it's the law to have clean and working lights at night (white at the front, red at the back), as well as a rear reflector. It's good to fit spoke reflectors too.
- 5** Of course, 'Being Bright' isn't the only way to stay safer. If you're out at night, choose routes and crossing places that are well lit and remember to always use the Green Cross Code.

Nursery



We have had another busy half term in Nursery and it is a pleasure to watch your children as they grow in confidence and independence .

Aswell as lots of fun, through our topic a 'Starry Night,' we have learnt a great deal too. We know that at night time it goes dark and that nocturnal animals are those who come out at night and that during Winter some animals choose to hibernate.

The last two weeks we have acted out the Nativity story, listened and danced to Christmas songs, drank hot chocolate, played with bubbles and balloons and have been super busy making Christmas crafts for our friends and family to enjoy.

Reception

This half term we started off learning about festivals of light. We had our own fire where we toasted marshmallows.

We have had many visitors including a school nurse teaching us about oral hygiene and PC Tim talking about stranger danger.

We visited Walsall Leather Museum where we were little elves making shoes for the shoemaker.



Year 1

This half term we stepped back in time to experience life as a Victorian pupil. We role played what a Victorian classroom was like and looked at artefacts from the past. We went to the Black Country Living Museum and discovered what old buildings, factories, shops, clothes, transport and toys looked like. Our journey into the past brought history to life in the most exciting way.



Year 2

This half term has been a busy one! In literacy we have been working hard to improve our descriptive writing, using adjectives and adverbs to write effective narratives. In topic, we have completed a DT project called "Push and Pull". During the project, we looked at different types of mechanisms such as slider and lever mechanisms.

All of our hard work paid off when we created our own moving greetings card!

Year 3

This half term in our topic 'Through the Ages', we have learnt about the Roman invasion of Britain. We learnt about the important changes to housing and diets that occurred during this period. As part of our DT project we designed, made and evaluated brooches. We had a lot of fun in this topic finishing with Roman art work and mosaics.



Year 4

In our topic this half term we have been learning about Vikings and invasion, we went on a trip to Tamworth Castle and learnt all about how Vikings dressed, what they ate and how they lived.

In literacy we have been working hard and wrote a non-chronological report on anglerfish! In guided reading we have finished reading Harry Potter and learnt all about J.K Rowling!



Year 5

In Year 5 this half term, we have had great fun learning about all sorts of forces in Science. We made parachutes to test air resistance and designed submarines to test water resistance. Finally, we built our own pneumatic systems using balloons, plastic tubing and syringes. We put these into Christmas boxes and had great fun decorating them!



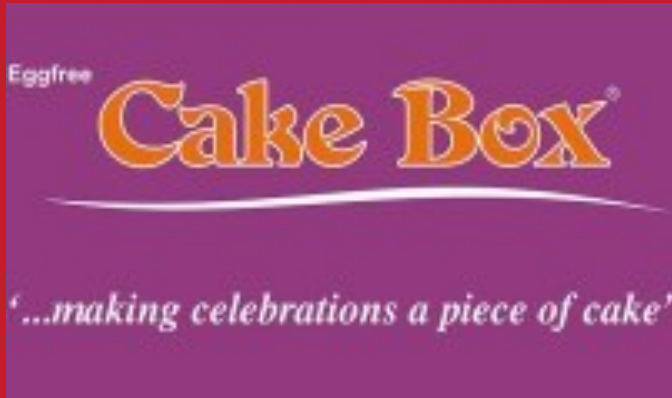
Year 6

This half term, Y6 have continued to learn about the Victorian period of history. This included learning about the many inventions and scientific breakthroughs that occurred during that period. We also learnt about the lives of rich and poor children at that time, including what school life was like for those children who were lucky enough to get an education at all. This included learning to sew and unlike in Victorian times both boys and girls joined in. We learnt running stitch, back stitch and cross stitch. Then we designed and sewed our own simple designs (see below).
